WWDC'96 Summary

Here is a short wrap-up of what was happening on the Newton front at Apple's World Wide Developers Conference 1996, held May 13-17 in San Jose, California.

The Newton was prominently mentioned as a future product and solution by CEO Gil Amelio in his opening comments to Apple Macintosh and Newton developers at Apple's World Wide Developers Conference (WWDC) 1996. The Newton and other \$1000 or less 'appliances' will be moved into a new organization being called "Information Appliances." This division will also include the Pippin. There was even a demo of a MP130 running the Newton Internet Enabler (NIE) using AllPen's NetHopper to surf the Internet from the conference stage. The Newton was also mentioned in Dr. Larry Tesler's talk on Apple's Internet Strategy. On the rumor mill side, it does appear that folks at Apple are working on a roaming 'walkabout.' Not sure if this a Newton, Macintosh, or what but it is probably a good bet that more rumors will abound on this one.

Unfortunately, the VP of the Newton System Group (NSG), Sandy Benett was not able to attend the Executive Chat Session on Wednesday night. But those who cleared their WWDC sessions to be at the chat were able to speak with Apple Fellow Steve Capps. The discussions were heated and could be characterized as a 'bitching' session, which was not what I expected at all. Steve Capps did a great job of trying to keep things in line, and took a great deal of notes that he promised to share with others in the NSG. Unfortunately about half of the people in the room seemed to wanting more vertical market focus, while the other half wanted more horizontal market focus. The one nice thing though was that everyone seemed to think that Newton 2.0 was a tremendous achievement, and that a 'smaller-form-factored-StrongARM-powered-Newton' would be an ideal hardware improvement.

In a pretty full session called "Developers Intro to Newton 2.0," Rick Fleischman gave a complete overview of Newton OS 2.0, highlighted the functionality of the Newton ToolKit (NTK) 1.6, and announced that by the end of Jul96 the Newton C++ Tools 1.0 kit will be released. Michael Tibbott also a good intro demo of the NTK 1.6. The next version of the NTK is expected to offer: an Object Inspector; team programming support; improved search & replace; integrated documentation; and custom Listener buttons. In the session "Integrating Mac Applications with Newton PDAs," David Fedor did a great job introducing the Desktop Integration Libraries (DILs) to another pretty big crowd. There were two demos by 3rd parties: Revelar showed their Revelar Connection Utility (RCU) and On Technology showed Meeting Maker for the Newton. David spent some time talking about the new Package Desktop Integration Libraries (PDILs). These will enable Newton pkgs to talk to desktops without Newton developers having to program a desktop application.

The big event though for Newton folks was the "Internet Connectivity with Newton 2.0" session that focused on the 'just entering beta stage' Newton Internet Enabler (NIE). This plug-in module for Newton 2.0 supports: PPP, SLIP, TCP, UDP, DNS, and ICMP. Connections can be through an Internet Service Provider (ISP) or serial. There were also three demos: Qualcomm's Eudora Pro for the Newton 2.0; Greg Simon and Steve Weyer's Newscape; and AllPen's NetHopper. The demos of Eudora Pro and NetHopper used a CDMA & analog enabled cellular phone, and PC Card modem currently being developed by Qualcomm.

Newton Internet Enabler Available To Developers

Apple has announced the availability of the beta version of the Newton Internet Enabler (NIE) for Newton 2.0 to Newton developers. NIE is a suite of connectivity tools that allows Internet-based solutions development for Newton Personal Digital Assistants (PDAs), including the Apple MessagePad. NIE will enable Newton developers to deliver Internet-based solutions such as Web, mail, news, Telnet and FTP clients. NIE also supports PPP, SLIP, UDP, dialer script engine, and DNR. To get access to NIE a Newton developer should send a request to: <NewtonDev@applelink.apple.com>. The final NIE release is expected by the end of Jun96.

Who are Building NIE Solutions?

In a press released entitled "Developer Community Embraces Newton Internet Enabler" Apple is reporting that over 50 independent and corporate software developers -- including QUALCOMM; AllPen Software; Lunatech Research; Fetch Software; InfoMed/Point of Care; NetStrategy; PenVision; Tactile Systems and SRL Data -- are building NIE solutions. With Newton Internet Enabler (NIE), developers will be able to create email and Internet solutions which support standard protocols such as MIME, SMTP and POP3 (email) and HTTP and HTML (Web browsing). NIE is currently in beta form and is expected to be available in final form by the end Jun96. Act Review

In July's MacWorld, Tom Negrino reviews ACT 2.5.1 for the Macintosh and Act for the Newton 1.0. The Macintosh version gets good points for: "solid contact management; innovative fax, mapping, and scanning links" but low points for: "lag[ging] way behind competition in scheduling; clunky Windows feel." Overall rating: Three Stars (5.1 points). The Newton version pros include: "easy to use; well integrated with Newton OS." But on the con side of things: "Poor synchronization; painfully slow." Overall rat-

Newton Scores Well in Byte Test

Thomas Marshall at Byte Magazine has a "SPECIAL REPORT: Well-Connected PDAs" published in the 01May96 issue. The report examines the following midrange PDAs:

- Apple Newton MessagePad 120
- Hewlett-Packard 200LX
- Hewlett-Packard OmniGo 100
- Psion Series 3a
- Sharp Zaurus ZR-5000FX

The MessagePad got high marks for: Newton 2.0 features like Routing, desktop connectivity, printing to a wide range of printers, handwriting recognition, and ability to add a keyboard. In the end though, Marshall writes: "The 200LX has the most extensive desktop compatibility and connectivity options for PC environments. For the Macintosh, the MessagePad 120 with a connection kit is a natural partner. If data-entry ease is your top criterion, the Series 3a and Zaurus ZR-5000FX sport relatively large, easy-to-use keypads. Number crunchers will find the 200LX handiest because of its numeric keypad and embedded applications. If what you want most is simply a PDA that's easy to carry around and works without fuss, the OmniGo takes the cake: It's small and light, with an easy-to-use interface and a comfortable keypad and pen."

Newton 2.0 is a Winner

In the same issue of Byte Magazine (01May96), Tom Thompson has a review of Newton 2.0. Tom thinks Apple has done an amazing job with Newton 2.0, and points out that the Newton by mid-year will be a full blown "low-cost Internet terminal" when the TCP/IP stack ships. The most noticeable improvement -- handwriting recognition that was easily able to handle pesky WWW URLs "without problems" and handle sentences like -- "Talked to Jon about an HQX file for the PowerPC BYTEmark archive." Other bonuses: input caret, Newton Keyboard, Digital Ink, landscape mode, and improved memory management. The only downside was that Newton 2.0 appeared rather "sluggish" when doing recognition. But Thompson notes that the new StrongArm processor should fix this problem.

Newton Pros & Cons

Henry Norr <henry_norr@macweek.com> has an article called "Newton's still important arrow in Apple's quiver" in the MacWeek published on 13May96. Norr feels that Newton is a "significant strategic asset for Apple" and he is glad that Amelio "seems to put in a good word for the Newton in every public appearance." The recent 'pro' assets: Newton 2.0, handwriting recognition that works, MP130 has backlighting, and loyal developers. On the 'con' side of things though: MP120 and MP130 are too expensive for mainstream audiences, form factor is too big to easily carry, performance can be "sluggish at times", and Apple delaying shipping Newton Connection Utilities (NCU) and their TCP/IP stack.

Newton Related Store In Belgium

Discouraging Medical Info???

Bruce Tong <zztong@MAIL.EV.NET> reported the following on the Magic Cap mailing list in regards to Apple's position in the medical community:

"If anything was obvious from the recent Hand-Held Computing in Healthcare Forum last week in San Francisco, it's [that] the only vendor with good penetration in the Healthcare industry is IBM, in the form of mainframes. Less than half of this industry is even computerized. In Healthcare computing, PDAs remain a drop in the bucket. To hint that the Newton is a dominant force in Healthcare is just not true. To even say that Newton is the largest PDA force in Healthcare isn't even true, as PDAs based on closed/proprietary systems are the current PDA heavies for Healthcare. Newton does have a head start on Magic Cap in the Healthcare arena. However, there are now two Healthcare related applications in the works for Magic Cap. As far as the Healthcare industry is concerned, look for slow developments. This industry has few standards, small margins, and large proprietary systems. All of these factors spell out slow growth."

Mark uses his Newton as a personal information manager and adding the Black Book has given him access to complete medical information in subjects like: cardiology, bacteriology, fungal infections, and health maintenance. There are 2355 Newton pages of information in Black Book. The design and layout of the information is extremely well done, and there is also very good search functionalities. The biggest limitation is not really Newton related but in that the content and commentary may or may not be enough in all cases. You should be able to

What Is The Price Of Wireless?

The biggest hurdle is probably that you have to spend a whole lot of money on a single vendor solution that will not interoperate with anything else, and you will get very low bandwidth for this high price. More vendors are expected to have more interoperable and cheaper solutions in 1997 though -- Proxim, 3Com, and Xircom were mentioned by name.

New Broad Wireless Lan Connectivity

Business Wire is reporting that Digital Ocean, Digital Equipment Corporation (DEC), and Lucent Technologies have a new wireless LAN solution that embraces both Mac OS, Newton, and PC platforms. The solution revolves around the "new ability" of two Digital Ocean station products to interoperate with Digital's RoamAbout and Lucent's WaveLAN wireless system for the PC environment. The Digital Ocean remote products are the Manta series (\$799) providing AAUI or 10BaseT connection to any Macintosh, and the Grouper series (\$749), supporting LocalTalk connections for any Macintosh or Newton MessagePad clients. Both products, initially offered in 915 MHz, provide "wireless Ethernet connectivity to wired infrastructures through RoamAbout and WavePOINT Access Points."

PDA Comparisons

In MacWorld's July issue, there are comparisons of the following PDAs on pages 102 - 107: MP120 with Newton 2.0, Psion Series 3a, Sharp Zaurus ZR-5000, and Sony Magic Link PIC-2000 with Magic Cap 2.0. The author of this article is Cary Lu. All the units were tested for features, implementation, innovation, performance, reliability, ease of use, and value. The MP120 scored the highest with: Three Stars (6.3 points). Second was the Zaurus with Two Stars (4.8 points). Both the Magic Link and the Psion tied for third with Two Stars (4.2 points). The article ends without a recommendation but with this blurb:

"PDAs are all about doing real work on the run, then connecting up with your home base. While each unit has some advantages, the Apple MessagePad 120 comes closest to being a strong and useful device, we think that for most people, PDAs are still more promise than practical tool."

Also in this issue, Cary Lu has a quick look at the Palm Computing's Pilot on page 41. For \$299 you get a 128K unit that can hold 500 names, or you can spend \$399 and get the 512K unit that is suppose to be able to hold much more. Big attractions for the Pilot, according to Cary, are speed and size.

Color Zaurus

Sharp is planning on showing off their Color Zaurus MI-10 on 25Jun96. This device will also be able to use a digital camera with an optional PC card. [iNews]

Pilot Review

The Palm Computing's Pilot 1000 gets a 'great' review by Dylan Tweney in InfoWorld published on 13May96. PROS: "Small Form factor; easy synchronization with desktop data via desktop cradle; accurate Graffiti handwriting recognition; long battery life." CONS: "Knowledge of Graffiti needed for stand-alone data entry; limited Pilot Desktop import and export filters." Palm Computing also reports that there are nearly 500 developers writing solutions for the Pilot. No mention that you can not yet use the Pilot for email. [Page 118]

Betas of Pegasus

In the Briefly Noted section on Page 3 of 20May96 edition of PC Week is a blurb that states -- "More than 50 PDA prototypes running Microsoft's forthcoming Pegasus operating system were on display this month at a design preview in Redmond, Washington, including systems from Casio and NEC Technologies. A Pegasus SDK is expected to ship to 3rd party developers this week."

More On Microsoft Pegasus

Some analysts got to take a look at Microsoft's Windows 95 operating system for personal digital assistants codenamed 'Pegasus.' Devices running Pegasus are expected in Q1,97 -- with seven companies building units. The

Pegasus OS will ship with slimmed down versions of Word and Excel on its 5.5-MB ROM. There will also be an email client and a PIM. Analysts' reaction was "mixed" with many feeling that Apple's Newton already has the functionality that the demo showed, but the mere fact that this is a Microsoft 'Windows' product would be enough to sell units. Another new item from the article, included plans may be in the works for a version of Windows NT burned into 4MB ROMs to be run on PowerPC based handhelds and notebooks. [PC Week, Norvin Leach, Mark Moore, and Lisa DiCarlo, 06May96, p. 116]

What's New in Displays

If you are very interested in the state of display technology and what new technology is coming for handheld units, then you'll want to track down OEM Magazine published 01May96. David Lieberman has an excellent article called "Features Balancing Act -- Handheld makers walk a line between display clarity and cost "

These displays are falling into niches because the diverse environments displays are showing up in. The display for an avionics instrument is not going to for sure work with a PDA. The same is true for videophones, handheld games, etc. ... The one thing that is true about this market is that many people are working on a great deal of different solutions.

So what drives the display market? Number one is cost. Second is battery life. Third is readability. Surprising huh?!? Another big thing is that backlighting can at times violate all of these main driving forces, but the market still demands it which still apparently makes display vendors cringe. What are the basic technologies?

- passive LCD
- active-matrix LCD
- electroluminescent displays

An LCD can also be reflective or transmissive. Plus most displays also have to have an "integrated a touch-screen overlay for touch and pen." And most of the current displays are black and white with some offering grayscale and even fewer offering filtered colors.

In the future, display designers are promising cheaper, less power, and greater readability. Also color is a big R&D resource consumer at the moment, but we are still several years away from a millions of color MessagePad that won't suck 4 AA batteries in 10 minutes.

Recent PDA News Shows Life in the Market

John Marrin at Computer Shopper in the "Mobile Trends" column published 01Jun96 answers the question "Who said the PDA market is dead?" To do this he quickly moves through the recent news that:

- Palm Computing is shipping their Graffiti based Pilot unit
- Nokia is going to be using Geoworks in an upcoming "smart cell phone"
- Apple has shipped the MP130 with a backlit screen, a better screen for viewing, and 512K more system memory.
- The Portable Computer and Communications Association (PCCA) now has an universal interface for wireless data transfer called STD-201 with RAM Mobile, Ardis, and Metricom already supporting the standard.

Pegasus Rumors

Spencer F. Katt in his weekly "Rumor Central" column in PCWeek on page 122 has the following two quotes from a recent visitor to Microsoft's Redmond offices to check out the Pegasus OS:

- "Close enough."
- "They didn't screw it up this time."

General Magic To Target Vertical Markets

Yvonne Lee has a 'news' and 'opinion' piece on page 52 in InfoWorld published on 29Apr96. The article focuses on the recent news that Magic Cap has bought Presto Mail and Presto Links from Active Paper, and will use

these applications to position Magic Cap savvy PDAs as a vertical market building block for those in the health care, transportation, and retail sales markets that are not traditional computer users. Diana Hwang, an industry analyst with International Data Corporation, thinks according to the article, that General Magic will have an uphill battle considering the "healthy share of the market" the Apple Newton already has. But both companies will have additional challenges in the future when Microsoft's Pegasus OS ships.

Forget Presto Demos, Here Is The Real Thing!

General Magic <<http://www.genmagic.com>> has announced that they have purchased Presto!Mail 1.5 and Presto!Links 1.0 Internet applications, developed by Active Paper <<http://www.apix.com>>. Both Internet savvy tools will be bundled with Magic Cap OS based Sony MagicLink and Motorola Envoy communicators.

PDAs Gathering Steam???

"Rites Of Ascension: PDAs Come Of Age, Part 1" is an article by Clifford Meth in the 01May96 edition of Electronic Design. The focus of this article is to examine the PDA market from top to bottom, from its begins to the current crop of technologies being offered -- Sharp's Wizards & Zaurus, HP's 200LX & Omni GoOrganizer Plus, Casio Bosses, Apple's Newton, Sony's MagicLink, Motorola's wireless Envoy and Marco, and U.S. Robotics/Palm Computing's Pilot. The article examines PDA design issues, processor offerings, pricing, PDA market trends, and new players like Hyundai, LG Electronics, Vadem, and Philips that are getting into the market. Other pieces of interesting information:

- Vertical markets solutions that use PDAs are now an established marketplace.
- Price is the biggest factor for the horizontal market.
- The industry is streamlining features to meet product definitions.

Two New PDA Savvy Chips From Philips

Electronic Buyers' News has an article by Jonathan Cassell in their 29Apr96 edition entitled "Philips Seeks To Raise PDAs From The Dead." The article focuses on how three new chips from Philips hope to bring life to the "once-moribund market for PDAs." These chips the, PR31100 and UCB1100, would allow a manufacturer to build a "PDA, personal intelligent communicator (PIC), or Internet-access terminal" in the \$500 range. Apple is crediting with spearheading the market, but is also ripped for hyping the market to a point past which the technology could actually deliver. Details on the chips:

"PR31100 is based on a 40-MHz version of the 32-bit Mips R3000 microprocessor 4 Kbytes of instruction cache and 1 Kbyte of data cache. To speed the execution of DSP functions, the PR31100 includes an integrated MAC unit."

"The PR31100 consumes only 9 milliwatts per MHz at 3.3 volts."

"The PR31100 includes SFM1100 technology that can run algorithms including 14.4-Kbit/s V.32bis, V.29 fax modem, cellular integration, and caller ID."

"The UCB1100 includes a 14-bit telecom codec, a 12-bit audio codec, four 10-bit A/D converters, and a 10-bit resistive touch-screen interface."

Pricing for the two chip set and the SFM1100 software is \$38 each in sets of 100,000s. Samples should be available now, and production in large volumes is expected by the end Q3'96.

General Magic Not Down And Out Yet

Cynthia Boumellis had an article in Electronic News entitled "General Magic May Weave Its Spell Yet" on 29Apr96. The main focus of the article is that General Magic may appear to be down and out according to some analysts, but they do have some powerful technologies that are Internet savvy -- Telescript and Magic Cap. And General Magic's survival could depend on

(according to some other analysts) these technologies and how they are marketed and positioned over the next 6 months. Some other interesting information from this article:

- Dataquest says the "worldwide shipments for handheld devices haven't even cracked 30,000 units since mid-1994."
- PDA technology is a "10-year push" according to Steve Schramm, VP of General Magic's Magic Cap Division
- Schramm also says, "We have \$100 million in the bank and are investing it in R&D ..."
- Andrew Seybold feels that General Magic's niche is "Telescript agents"
- Tim McCarthy, Motorola, says that "lifecycle for handheld communicators is about 18-24 months"
