Apple and Newton OS 2.0

Diana Hwang at Computer Reseller News has an article called "Emerging Technologies: Newton's New Top Gun Ready For Battle Ahead" in the 28Aug95 issue. Here is the major info:

- Sandy Benett is acting VP and director of engineering of the Newton Systems Group (NSG), he has been at Apple for two years, and was formerly at Go Corp.
- Sandy thinks that the next version of the Newton OS will successfully meet customer needs because Apple has been listening and watching the market for the last two years
- this Fall will bring the Newton OS 2.0 (with little hype), new development tools, and the Newton Connection Kit (NCK) 3.0
- the NOS 2.0 will have tight integration between the Newton and desktop machines, and will allow for better connectivity capabilities
- the NOS 2.0 upgrade will aid not only the consumer but also developers, system integrators, and value-added resellers (VARs)
- Claris is supposedly working on Newton applications [Article forwarded to NewtNews by Mark Heringer <4535904@mcimail.com>]

Yvonne Lee has an article in the 04Sep95 issue of InfoWorld about the next iteration of the Newton OS being prepped for release to developers in October 1995, with general availability slated for November 1995. Major new features:

- better handwriting recognition - better desktop synchronization
- portrait or landscape viewing mode
- support for multiple communication protocols
- programmable toolbar
- ability to view and annotate desktop files There is going to be a MP150 that is palm-sized and a MP200 that is slate-size. These will be available in 1996, with the MP150 shipping before the MP200.

Newton Highlighted in Mainstream Press

On Sunday, September 10, 1995 the San Francisco Examiner had an article called "Apple Hoping to Turn Around Its PDA PDQ." The article touches on the history of the last two years. Following is some of the interesting information that was included:

- one of the key reasons the Newton has survived is because of a "small core of software developers" who are creating great solutions

- development tools for the Newton is better than any other PDA platform
- PDA Developer magazine has over a readership over 1,000
- Industry analysts still feel that for PDAs to take-off they need an affordable and integrated access to two-way wireless networking
- Apple shipped 60,000 Newtons so far in 1995 and 78,000 in 1994.
- Apple is working with Cirrus Logic to develop a less power consuming ARM chip - DEC is also designing a new chip called "StrongARM" and should be available in Oct95, priced between \$10-20 depending on volume
- the high-end PDA price needs to be under \$500

Apple has finished Alpha testing and is now in Beta testing of the Windows Newton ToolKit (NTK) for developing Newton applications. Not only will be you be able to create Newton applications but you will also be able to create Newton Books. The rumor on the Net is that you can expect Windows NTK available for the general developer purchase sometime in Q1,96.

Corporate Downsizing

The Wall Street Journal recently reported that Motorola has plans to cut its staff at its wireless data group by about 20% or about 180 jobs. Motorola officials said that it still "remains committed to developing the market for its new wireless product line" The principle reason for the cuts has been attributed to the "poorly developing PDA market." The state of the market is compared to the cellular phone market of 10 years ago -- little growth, high prices. The cuts were deepest (20%) in the PDA area, but according to Motorola officials they should not effect current Envoy, Marco, and communication based PC Card efforts.

Photonics, the makers of wireless infrared LAN technology for Macs, Newtons, and Intel machines, has reportedly stopped all development, and slashed their staff from 27 to 7. The company is looking for a merger partner. [MacWeek, 04Sep95, Nathalie Welch, page 24]

CE Software has finished up MobileVision for the Macintosh/Newton that enables a QuickMail (QM) server to connect to the ARDIS wireless radio network. After loading up your QM Server with the necessary software and your Macro with a client Newton application, you can deliver wireless QM messages. Wireless Access Gets Easier

McCaw Cellular (800.426.2229) and RAM Mobile Data (800.792.3210) are both expending a large amount of resources to insure that they can extend their range of wireless connectivity for their current and future customers. McCaw is focusing on providing broadband PCS network using Time Division Multiple Access (TDMA) technology. RAM Mobile is adding 150 base stations by the end of this year, and another 350 next year. McCaw is planning to have 80% of the US covered, and RAM Mobile is aiming for having 94% of urban US covered. [PCWeek, 28Aug95, Michael Moeller, page 41]

Lotus Notes is expected to get wireless access enabled on AirMobile in limited functions in Q4,95 - with full functions enabled in Q1,96. [PCWeek, 21Aug95, Michael Moeller and Paula Rooney, page 2]

Hitachi has announced a new "advanced mobile communication terminal with a high-resolution (480 x 320-pixel) 80-column LCD" to be released in Japan on 01Dec95. The "Multicomunicator Possible" will have a internal modem, and allow communications over cellular and standard telephone. Users will be able to access online services, and send and receive email and faxes. Data will be entered into the device using a pen and include handwriting recognition. Hitachi is expected to offer two models for 98,000 and 125,000 yen. This device will be the major competitor against Sharp's Zaurus, the leader of the Japanese market. In 1994, Zaurus sold 380,000 units. [Data compiled from Online Services offered by CompuServe]

MagicCap folks reported on the MagicCap mailing list that in the "Tech Ticker" column on page one of the business section on the San Jose Mercury WWW page had the following headline: "Staff Shake-up under way at General Magic" and the following very short blurb:

"General Magic Inc.'s top marketing executive resigned and its co-founder and top scientist have taken a three-month leave, just six months after the software maker debuted as one of the hottest technology stocks to go public this year. General Magic, which makes software for hand-held computers and telecommunications networks is planning to announce a reorganization next week, spokeswoman Jane Anderson said."

The latest edition of PowerPC News, 28Aug95, reports that Motorola is nearly ready to show off their new embedding PowerPC chip called the MPC821 that is designed for PDAs, smartphones, and set-top boxes.

While Motorola's Envoy and Macro wireless devices have a combination of vertical and horizontal usages, the Forte CommPad is designed completely as a vertical market solution. It is a ruggedized 25-MHz 486SX that uses Windows for Pen Computing Environment, and it comes with a built-in wireless radio modem that accesses the Motorola 800-MHz DataTac network. The Microsoft OS is codenamed 'Pegasus' and will compete directly with the NOS 2.0. It will not run Windows applications but they will have "scaled-down versions of Word and Excel." Panasonic has developed a new personal electronic organizer with an integrated scanner, which can read in information from business cards, and keep a file of up to 500 records, including logos. The NeoFile, priced at \$399.95, is also capable of hooking up to a personal computer to share data. [Knight-Ridder]

Sharp has announced that it will be publishing a new newsletter called 'Digital Ink' that will focus on the new Zaurus applications and emerging technologies about the product. Sharp has plans to sell a "business-use version" of their Zaurus electronic organizer that is: larger than previous models, runs MS-DOS, and uses a bigger liquid-crystal display.

The biggest pros for Equate is: convenient Excel compatibility and special spreadsheet keyboard. The biggest pros for QFP is: fast, and includes charting and linear equation solving. The biggest cons for Equate is that it is slow loading, saving, and recalc. The biggest cons for QFP is that file imports require workarounds. To sum it up, Charles says that Equate is the best Newton spreadsheet if you have to have desktop Excel connectivity, and QFP is the best "stand-alone" spreadsheet for the Newton. - Winner: WakeUpWeek by Ben Gottlieb (Stand Alone Software). This is a set of tools for getting organized, including agenda management, notes, to-dos, and appointments.
- Honorable Mentions: MPG by Hardy Macia (Catamount Software). This package acts as a mileage log. And PocketMoney, also by Hardy Macia. This packages help you to keep track of bank accounts on your Newton.

Stand Alone has released the following software to most online services:

Jumble v1.0 -- is a word search game wherein the player attempts to find words hidden in a two dimensional grid of letters. Puzzles can be created with pre-determined sets of words to find, or the Newton can generate these lists randomly, resulting in unlimited game play. Jumble is \$15 shareware with a 30-day demo.

Speed v1.1 -- is a collection of enhancements for the built in Names file and Note Pad applications. Normally, switching to a particular folder on a Newton with several hundred names or notes takes as long as several minutes, but with Speed installed, this time is cut to a matter

of seconds. Speed also allows the user to view email addresses from any portion of the names file, set certain start up options for the Names file (such as it's initial folder and view) and gives several options for quickly going to a particular name card (a scribble window, pop-up menu, and mini-keyboard.) Speed is \$25 shareware with a 30-day demo.

Wake Up Week (WUW) v2.73 -- is a full featured agenda management application that allows the user to quickly view all upcoming events (meetings, day notes, and to dos,) over a certain user-definable period (anywhere from one day to three years) from a variety of places on the Newton. WUW recently won MacUser's best Newton Shareware product award for 1995. WUW is \$20 shareware with a 30-day demo.

Recent Events

Newton Development Conference Info

Underscoring the momentum behind the Newton platform, several hundred developers from all around the globe converged upon San Francisco this past week to participate in Apple's 2nd Newton Platform Development Conference, entitled "Turn on the Light." In response to developer feedback, Apple announced that it is dropping the 1% royalty fee for developing on the Newton platform, and highlighted Apple's comprehensive developer support programs and co-marketing opportunities. The underlining theme though was on developer related information, particularly on what programmers were going to have to do to make their code behave as a Newton OS 2.0 savvy application.

Keynote speakers at this year's conference included Michael Spindler, president and CEO of Apple, and Guy Kawasaki, who recently joined the company as an Apple Fellow. A noted author, columnist and speaker, and the founder of various personal computing enterprises, Kawasaki has played a significant leadership role in the "evangelism" of the Apple Macintosh computer and its software. Spindler outlined how Newton technology fits into Apple's corporate product plan and overall company strategy, while Kawasaki described the role Apple will play in supporting Newton developers and highlighted the rich array of software titles available for the Newton platform.

So what was the agenda at the Newton Developer Conference? Here is a break down on what happened each day:

- Wednesday: Newton ToolKit (NTK); other tools, Soups & Stores (Newton object storage system), Protos (used to display data), Views (interface, manipulations, buttons), Compatibility (current a future OSes and hardware)
- Thursday: Recognition, using Text and Ink, System Services (routing, storage, finding, etc. ...), I/O box and Routing, building custom communication services, and using new communications
- Friday: building custom application extensions, DIL (Desktop Integration Libraries), Application Frameworks, and Developer Support Review.

In addition to the formal sessions, the conference offered technical forums where Newton engineers answered developers' questions. A hands-on testing and programming lab was open until 2 am for those who wanted to write new code or test existing code against the new technologies.
