Newton Part Of The Spotlight At Macworld Tokyo

Dr. David Nagel, senior vice president of Worldwide Research and Development, delivered the MacWorld Tokyo 1996 keynote address, focusing on Internet solutions, Asia specific products, and Apple's future platform directions. In his keynote address, Nagel reiterated Apple's commitment to providing customers worldwide with an Apple experience on the Internet. Demonstrating Apple products including CyberDog, Newton on the Internet, Pippin on the Internet, as well as Adobe's PageMill-J (Japanese version). Nagel showed Japanese customers just how easy it is to customize an Internet interface, collect and organize Internet resources and publish information. Nagel also showed the Chinese Dictation Kit, Korean Language Kit, Mac OS running on prototype PowerPC platform workstation, Copland, English and Japanese localized OpenDoc, and some music enhancements that will be part of QuickTime 2.2. MacWorld Tokyo, which runs from 22-24Feb96, is the largest MacWorld Expo in the world and is expected to draw recordbreaking crowds of over 170,000 attendees.

tours. Typically, museums use tape recorders which one can rent and then follow a prescribed path to learn all the specifics of the exhibits. Since the folks at the Smithsonian wanted people to be able wander freely - not to be constrained by any set path - they followed a different "path" themselves. They adapted a Newton MessagePad to deliver the audio message. Every exhibit is numbered. When you arrive at the exhibit, you press its number into the large keypad pictured on the face of the Newton - the appropriate explanation is played back through earphones. Pretty nifty."

And this tidbit is from Robert Whitman:

"Metro Dade Fire Rescue (Miami, FL) is a mostly-Macintosh computing environment with several hundred desktop and laptop Macintoshes, and Newton MessagePads. The department uses Macintosh to coordinate and communicate among its neighborhood fire stations, administrative offices and mobile/airborne Emergency Medical units all around Dade County."

German Newton 2.0 Is Shipping Someplaces

Michael Bodmer <visions@mail.access.ch> and Christian Schweizer <cschweizer@access.ch> both report that the NewtonShop in Switzerland is selling MP120s with German 2.0 as of 21Feb96. The units are selling for 965 Swiss Francs or US\$800, which is about the same price as the International Z-Version of MP120 (in English) selling in Central Europe. The German 2.0 is localized for Switzerland, Germany, and Austria (switchable by pop-menu); and there are modifications based on the above choice to wordlists, and date & time formats. The upgrade for current German MP120s running Newton OS 1.3 are not expected to be available until sometime between March and April 1996.

Supercomputing in the Palm of Your Hand

Digital Equipment Corporation (DEC) has finally introduced the much anticipated SA-110 StrongARM microprocessor -- "the first processor to combine the performance of a supercomputer with power dissipation low enough to run on AA batteries, and pricing which is geared toward mass-market, consumer electronics products." The StrongArm market is seen by DEC as to include: PDA developers, smart phone manufacturers, set-top box suppliers, video games, and companies exploring the Network Computer (NC) or Internet Terminal (IT). >From the PDA standpoint -- "Apple's Newton team and the StrongARM design team have worked closely together during the past eighteen months," said Michael Culbert, Newton system architect at Apple "We are very excited about this new technology and its potential to carry the next generation of Newton PDAs to a new level. Our customers and licensees will be delighted by the new applications and human interface capabilities this chip can enable." Plus Papyrus Associates believes the StrongARM technology will "improved handwriting recognition software." And Dragon Systems believes the SA-110 will allow them to "provide advanced speech recognition capabilities for handheld portable products." Details on the three chip offerings:

- The 100 MHz part operating at 1.65 volts, delivers 115 Dhrystone 2.1 MIPS while dissipating less than 300 mW of power. Pricing is less than \$29 in 10k unit quantities.
- The 160 MHz version delivers 185 Dhrystone 2.1 MIPS at only 450 mW of power dissipation, giving a performance/power ratio (MIPS-per-watt) of over 400. This chip is available for \$49 in 10k quantities.
- The 200 MHz chip operates at 2.0 volts and performs 230 Dhrystone 2.1 MIPS while still running on under a watt of power. This chip is priced at under \$50 and achieves the industry's best performance/price ratio at almost 5 MIPS/\$ (MIPS-per-dollar).
- The SA-110 can accommodate 3.3 volt input/output levels, allowing system designers to utilize off-the-shelf 3.3 volt memories and other commodity components.

While not a surprise to long time NewtNews readers, some of the more recent ones might be surprised to know that Disneyland in Anaheim, California has been using Newtons to survey guests when they leave the park or finish a ride/event for quite some time. Some of the findings of using the Newton for data collection according to Tim who talked with one of the "cast members" collecting data:

- It does take a little bit more time to survey guests then paper surveys.
- But they have saved a lot more time in designing surveys and in tabulating results.
- Changing surveys by asking different questions based on earlier responses is much easier that the old paper surveys.

"The U.S. Air Force and MITRE Corp. are developing a handheld digital communicator that could be rushed into service to help military personnel clearing mines in Bosnia. The prototype Tactical Automated Situation Receiver (TASR) includes an Apple Computer Newton portable processor, a GPS receiver, and a commercial pager combined in a rugged unit. The Air Force has sent messages from a laptop computer to the handheld units warning of a missile attack. Minefield clearing involves warning the user when he is straying onto dangerous ground. TASR compares GPS position with constantly updated mine locations. Capt. William J. (Buzz) Szarek, the program manager of Hanscom AFB, Mass. said a go-ahead has not been given yet on units for Bosnia."

SplitRock Corporation along with CIS Technologies successfully demonstrated at Mactivity96 an automated dispatching system for service organizations linking their UniversalFormsManager (UFM) application running on the Newton 2.0 wirelessly connected to a 4D Database residing on a Mac desktop. UFM is an integrated package for creating PDA based forms for data capture and query from remote locations. Using custom comms functions SplitRock was able to transmit, receive and integrate data in real time. Field personnel collected forms-based data, transmitted to and from a desktop machine that integrated with CIS's 4D database used to generate service call slips, call sheets and general scheduling of their service personnel. This system is the prototype for a dispatching system for field engineers and technicians. It tracks service calls, tracks time for billing purposes, accepts client signatures for work authorization and integrates a faxback system to produce customer invoices. Indepth Report On GSM Connectivity

NewtNews thanks Howard for patiently answering all our questions, and for taking the time out of his busy schedule to give us very good answers.] In the last issue of NewtNews we mentioned a partial press release we came across that mentioned the Newton, Nokia new GSM phone, and Vodafone. We were pretty vague on what all of this meant to the average Newton user that had access to all of the above. Hopefully the following will clear all this up. It appears the Nokia GSM phone is actually model 2110e and when combined with the Australian Vodafone service you can get seamless international roaming which includes the following data services:

- phone to phone Short Message Service (SMS),
- dial-up access to send SMS,
- send fax,
- data connectivity

A SMS message typically costs about 15 cents a message with a max of 160 chars in a message. The monthly charge for a corporate GSM Australian user is \$30 a month, with charges in the range of 16-26 cents a minute during peak times for out going calls only. International calling can be much more expensive, but it can be at times less expensive then making a call from a hotel phone. You can get your Newton involved in this equation if you add the Nokia Cellular Data PCMCIA Card with a cable connecting you to the Nokia 2110e. This will give you pretty much seamless eWorld connectivity throughout Australia and many other countries.

The coolest thing is the wide spread connectivity you can get with GSM -from an airport lounge in Vienna, or on the bus in Stockholm, or to your customer offices in Sydney, or to your hotel room in Hong Kong you are totally connected. In Australia there is also two other services: Optus and Telstra -- so as a GSM user in Australia you are pretty much wired wherever you go.

Here is a complete list of countries that Vodafone has good roaming arrangements in: Andorra, Austria, Belgium, Cyprus, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Gibraltar, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Jersey, Latvia, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Turkey, Australia, Bahrain, Emirates, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Kuwait, Lebanon, Macau, Morocco, Philippines, Qatar, Singapore, South Africa, and Thailand. AT&T has stated that they will be offering some GSM capabilities in selected West Coast areas by Jan97. Pacific Bell also has plans to offer GSM in California in the not to distant future.

CDPD Expectations

AT&T Wireless, Bell Atlantic Nynex Mobile, and GTE Mobilnet continue to expand their CDPD offerings in 1996. Over the next six months expect: upgrade to 1.1 of CDPD specification; and more 3rd party products, services, and applications. [PCWeek, 29Jan96, Mark Moore, page 33]

More GSM News

Charles Ostrofsky <fort@his.com> reports that he has been using the new GSM PCS1900 offered by Sprint Spectrum in the Washington-Baltimore

area for the last couple of months and "it is [working] great." Jakob Peterhansel <jph_dd@aix1.danadata.dk> reports that the majority of the new GSM phones, like the Nokia 2100s series, are capable of using both PCS1900 and PCS1800.

Other PDA's

Magic Link with Phone

Sony is now packaging their Magic Link communicator, with Wireless Modem Link software, and a cellular phone.

Plans for Pegasus

Pegasus (codeword for PDA OS) from Microsoft is expected by some to finally bring the corporate world into the PDA realm. Microsoft is planning a Pegasus developers conference in May96, with beta testing beginning in Fall 1996. So far Casio, Epson, Compaq, and NEC are working on hardware. Intuit, River Run, and Pivotal are working on software. And AT&T and Skytel want to provide wireless network services. [PCWeek, 19Feb96, Mark Moore, page 108]

New PDA Chip

Intel has a new low-powered 486 chip (codenamed Hummingbird) for the PDA and Network Computer markets. The chip will support 16- and 32bits, and sell for under US\$50 in large quantities. Some companies suppose to be using the chip include: Oracle, Seiko Epson, and NEC. [PCWeek, 05Feb96, Page 3]

WinPad Project Back On

Microsoft it appears has taken the 18 month hold off the "WinPad" project and restarted it under the codename "Pegasus." Some core features will include: kernal uses Win32 API, support for wireless comms, and access to the Internet. The first betas are expected by the end of 1996. Software and hardware developers are supposedly pretty gunshy considering all the hype that WinPad would ship in 1993 but nothing became of the project. [PCWeek, 05Feb96, Mark Moore, page 8]

Major NewtNews kudos for Tim Hodges <Timothy.C.Hodges@Hitchcock.ORG>, author of WinNewt. He posted the following to USENET newsgroup comp.sys.newton.programmer:

"WinNewt is a graphical environment that lets you (1) design the user interface for your application, (2) write the NewtonScript code that will determine what these buttons, check boxes, etc. will do, all on your Windows PC. Once your app is complete, you can print, save, export to text, or download your code to your Newton using Steve Weyer's Slurpee. Then, using his Newt development environment, you can create standalone packages. "It's tough for an author to be objective about his/her work, but the pros/cons for WinNewt as I see them are:

"Pros:

1. It's the only Windows development environment for the Newton. MacNTK does not run under Executor/DOS.

2. The graphical interface lets you construct your interface on your PC.

3. You write NewtonScript code on your PC; you don't have to use the keyboard or HWR on the Newton.

4. WinNewt costs much less than MacNTK, even after you register Newt and Slurpee.

5. Free technical support with registration.

"Cons:

 WinNewt doesn't produce standalone packages by itself. Apple licenses the Newton package format, but (as yet) there is no independent desktop compiler that will create downloadable packages.
 WinNewt doesn't include support for NOS 2.0 (yet), although you

can add new functions in the Extra Frames section.

3. You have to use NewtonScript, which may mean learning a new language syntax.
