Booming Sales?!?

Apple sent out a press release on Friday afternoon, 18Apr97, at 5:03 P.M (EDT) that reports that since the MessagePad 2000's introduction on 24Mar97 that it is "selling briskly at both the corporate and retail levels." No hard data was available to back-up the 'booming sales' headline, but sources close to the 'real' numbers say that all 10,000 or so first run MP2Ks have been sold to Apple's retail channels. The only hint of real information was the phrase "our bookings rates are running five times as high as they were a year ago." The only other new piece of information was -- Steve Elms at Newton Source was quoted as saying that 60% of MP2K purchasers at Newton Source are Windows users, and 40% are Macintosh users. Apple Offers Deals to Previous Owners

Apple is offering previous MessagePad owners either a free Newton Keyboard or a US\$80 rebate on a Megahertz CruiseCard 28.8 PC Card modem (XJA3288). Apparently no photocopies of the rebate are allowed, and there doesn't appear to be a pointer available to this offer on the WWW. On 19Apr97, MacInTouch http://www.macintouch.com reported the following in regards to the previous Newton owners deal on purchasing a MP2K:

The deal requires a coupon, however, and not all MessagePad owners have

received the coupon. If you have registered an earlier MessagePad, and you have not received the coupon, you can email: <mp2000promo@newton.apple.com> with the serial number of your early MessagePad to get it. The offer is:

"Purchase a MessagePad 2000 and receive EITHER a free keyboard OR an \$80 mail-in rebate on the Megahertz XJA3288 modem. Once you get the coupon, send it in along with a copy of the MP2000 receipt (and if you want the rebate also include a copy of the XJA3288 sales receipt and the UPC code cut from the XJA3288 carton)."

Newton Continues to Create Rumor Press

The 'rumor mill' got started again recently with more rumors on what is going to happen with the Apple's Newton System Group (NSG). While the stories started out with Sun Computer being interested in purchasing the NSG so that they could get a jump start on building small Java based PDAs, but by the end of the week the rumors 'matured' into a more of a partnership between Apple and Sun on the Newton.

The USA Today (article by Julie Schmit) also reported on the Newton status on 10Apr97. The article did point out that even though the MessagePad 2000 and the eMate 300 are "selling well", the high cost of Newton R&D is what Apple is apparently trying to negotiate with Sun. This article also mentioned that Apple talked with a Taiwanese company called Inventec about the NSG.

This 'investing' in Newton 'idea' was also pushed by Reuters over the weekend with quotes from Apple Internet Wizard Larry Tesler. So you could see 'investments' by other licenses of the Newton like: Motorola, Sharp, Panasonic, Digital Ocean, and Schlumberger.

Hancock Quote on the Newton



In addition, sources said, Apple has talked to venture-capital companies about spinning the business off as a separate company.



Newton Tidbits

Major Cool Newton Review

Mary Hayes has a Newton article in the 'Hardware' section of Information Week published on 28Apr97. The article is pretty positive on the current Newton technology, but also mention the recent apparent pondering of Apple selling off the Newton technology. The article does mention that Apple's current MessagePad 2000 could be sold in the 'thousands' of units to the Defense Department to be used with a Global Positioning Systems (GPS) space system.

The article also mentions the eMate 300, and that Apple has projects currently underway to improve Newton networking features, and to improve Newton access to corporate databases. There was also mention of a 'software modem' to lighten the 'weight' load on current MP2K systems. The article highlights two vertical MP2K solutions being deployed at The Sally Jobe Breast Diagnostic and Counseling Center in Englewood, Colorado; and at Bell Atlantic's Nynex Mobile New York district.

But the end of this article has some of the most interesting information seen recently:

Ken Dulaney, VP of mobile computing at Gartner Group Inc., an IT advisory firm in Stamford, Conn., estimates Apple has sold no more than 350,000 Newton-based systems since announcing the line in 1993. During that same period, Dulaney says, Apple's total investment in the product line has "easily" reached about \$1 billion. With the average MessagePad system selling for about \$800, that would mean total sales have come to only about \$300 million-or less than a third of Apple's total investment.

More Newton Sales Booming News

Steve Baker <power@startext.net> reported that TipWorld's Tip of the Day on 25Apr97 covered Apple's MessagePad 2000 "booming sales" news. The article also quotes the Casio Windows CE product manager as saying "Our

sales stink." And apparently the Windows CE hardware manufactures have submitted a list to Microsoft of all the stuff they need fixed before they release new hardware.

Tom Unkefer <nomadict@ix.netcom.com> responded to the Don Crabb news on comp.sys.newton.misc with a pointer to an independent market research report that he read awhile back. This report projected some 500,000 to 600,000 Windows CE devices would be sold in the first 3-6 months of shipping. The logic to this was apparently the large number of Windows users; and that the above numbers is definitely 'covered' by potential early adopters and 'techno-freaks.' If Casio did indeed make 200,000 units and only sold 120,000 this would probably be a 'big' problem with Casio financial and accounting folks.

Email Rebellion?!?

There appears to be the 'beginning of an email rebellion" on the USENET newsgroup comp.sys.newton.misc by many MP2K users who are not at all satisfied with the EnRoute email package that is shipping with the MP2K. The apparent popular other options include: Go Fetch Software's Go Fetch and Qualcomm's Eudora Pro for Newton.

This bundle is also very attractive because:

- gives you via PowerTrans any European keyboard localization
- gives the prospective buyer in my honest opinion a true killer application if command of languages is important for your career or business

Stefan discovered PowerTrans about a year ago, and found it indispensable in mastering technical translations between French, German and English. The unique learning mode of PowerTrans is another highlight. If you ever tried to learn a foreign language, than you will love this training mode: no more endless word lists, stupid repetitions of already known words, instead an intelligent Newton like learning that adapts to your individual abilities. With the latest version's support of speech, one can even get pronunciation right from the beginning. I think that the above decision of Propad is great news for all European Newton buyers.

Mr. Manes is unimpressed with: cost (according to him you can get a laptop for the US\$1100 price of an MP2K); handwriting recognition (still inaccurate); the screen technology (too slippery); poor documentation; non-attached keyboard and serial connector are 'design flaws'; weighs too much, too big to fit in a pocket; PC Cards are power hogs; power-eating backlighting; user interface is 'different enough' from others to be confusing and frustrating [Ed: Just say you want a Windows CE device and move on please.]; the MP2Ks IrDA can only communicate with other MessagePads [Ed: Wrong!]; voice dictation is rudimentary; and oversimplified modem

setup.

Mr. Manes [Ed: Probably because his editor forced him to] apparently tried to find some good things to say: desktop syncs with Mac and Windows; you can read the screen on an airplane; handy stand to prop the unit up [Ed: Called a 'lid?']; and he was surprised to find a lot of modems supported the Newton.

Overall, the MP2K was "too quirky and too expensive" and a perspective user would be better off with a laptop in Mr. Manes opinion.

[NewtNews has now learned the sad news that this MessagePad 2000 review has been picked up by the AP Newswire and is making its rounds across the United States and apparently the whole world. NewtNews saw the piece in the San Diego Union-Tribune's ComputerLink insert published on 22Apr97 (pages 12 - 13), and another NewtNews reader reported the review also made it to the front page of the IT section of the leading national newspaper in Australia.]

Newton Tips

Eject That Modem Card Before Reset

Josh Peterson <petersjf@ctrvax.vanderbilt.edu> reports that the current wisdom from Apple's SOS folks is that if you have to do a soft-reset or your Newton system restarts automatically on you, that you should remove a PC Card modem ASAP to insure things restart correctly. This is especially true if you are using a MP2000 with a Megahertz PC card modem (specifically the Megahertz XJ1144). Several folks on USENET newsgroup comp.sys.newton.misc have confirmed this suggestion works well.

Turn Off Apps with a Restart

To restart the Newt without loading any apps/autoparts press the restart button then press the pen against the left edge of the screen 1 cm above the end of the edge of the silkscreen above Names. A slip will ask if you want to load packages from internal. Tap no, then press the pen again in the same spot, and another slip will ask the same for card.

"Light" restart maximizes frame heap by sacrificing functionality. You can still activate packages selectively by tapping an inactive package's icon in Page 11 NewtNews Pro

extras which has a large X across it.

Use "Light" restart to increase responsiveness in special cases. Nick uses it when reconciling in PocketMoney to speed up scrolling dramatically and also to speed-up HWR recognition in long, or time critical note taking sessions.

This tip is most appropriate on MP120/2.0. MP130 has twice the frame heap of the MP120 so the frame conservation strategy may be less relevant. I don't know if it works on MP2K.

Open Apps With Keyboard Shortcuts

Stemming from my wish to be able to open applications with keyboard shortcuts I thought of a way to open the built in applications such as the, Names, Dates, and Notepad (if using a backdrop application). All of the built in applications can be accessed via the built in find utility (which of course can be brought up by pressing Command(Apple) F) after setting up a variation of the following procedure in each area.

To set up the Notepad to open with the keyboard do the following:

- 1. Open up an untitled note and select the title (Command E)
- 2. Write "keyword:" if desired and then enter a symbol that is easy to associate the application with. You can select a special symbol or character by using shift & option at the same time but option by itself is much quicker. For example, I typed in the character that is created by holding the option key and tapping the letter N twice. As long as you choose a character that you have written no where else, this trick will work.
- 3. Close the title and file the Keyword Note away where it wont bug you.
- 4. Try it out. Exit the Notepad, hit command F then hold option and tap the letter "N" for notepad twice then enter. Presto! From there you can use the command O for overview, command arrows to scroll up and down and the various other shortcuts to access folders. This trick is equally effective as a name card or a continuously forwarding to do item (which will always take you to the current day).

Developer's Corner

Newton Toolkit News

Several of Apple's very dedicated Newton Developer Technical Support (DTS) folks posted some details about what is going on with Newton Toolkit (NTK) for Macintosh and Windows recently on the USENET newsgroup comp.sys.newton.programmer.

Currently you can upgrade from NTK 1.0 to 1.5 to version 1.6.x for US\$50. The currently shipping version for the Macintosh is version 1.6.3 and will soon be upgraded to version 1.6.4. One of the new features in 1.6.4 is the ability to handle grayscale pictures and icons. If you are going to write new Newton OS 2.1 functionality then you'll need the Newton OS 2.1 platform file which is distributed among other places on the latest Newton Developer CDROM.

What are the main differences between Macintosh NTK and Windows NTK? Here is a summary:

- MacNTK has Bookmaker and support for the C++ tools (which run only on the Mac). WinNTK has none of these.
- There is a converter to go from MacNTK to WinNTK. There is no converter for the opposite direction.
- WinNTK is a port of a Mac program, and sometimes that shows in the interface
- MacNTK allows AppleTalk connections to the Newton device in addi-

tion to serial connections; WinNTK has only the serial connection.

 The QuickView online documentation that comes with MacNTK is a little more accessible (easier to use) than the WinHelp documentation that comes with WinNTK.
